




Perpetrators ask youth to keep conversations secret.



Child Sex Trafficking

The exchanging of something of value (money, clothing, shelter, etc.) for sex with a child/minor

Victims don't often recognize they're being trafficked.

It can happen to anyone regardless of age, culture, gender, neighborhood, etc.

The average age a child is trafficked is between 11 and 14 years old.


In 2020, boys made up 7% of child sex trafficking victims.





Healthy relationships bring out the **best in you** and make you **feel good about yourself**.

A healthy relationship does not mean a "perfect" relationship, and no one is healthy 100% of the time, but the following signs are behaviors you should strive for in all of your relationships.

Healthy relationships manifest themselves as healthy communication, but in order to have a healthy relationship, you need to **love yourself first**.

Intensity: When someone expresses very extreme feelings and overthe-top behavior that feels overwhelming.

Possessiveness: When someone is jealous to a point where they try to control who you spend time with and what you do.

Manipulation: When someone tries to control your decisions, actions or emotions.

Isolation: When someone keeps you away from friends, family or other people.

Sabotage: When someone purposely ruins your reputation, achievements, or success.

Belittling: When someone does and says things to make you feel bad about yourself.

Guilting: When someone makes you feel responsible for their actions or makes you feel like it's your job to keep them happy.


Volatility: When someone has a really strong, unpredictable reaction that makes you feel scared, confused or intimidated.

Deflecting Responsibility: When someone repeatedly makes excuses for their unhealthy behavior.

Betrayal: When someone is disloyal or acts in an intentionally dishonest way.

Child Sexual Assault

(under 17)

Fexas Penal Code PENAL § 22.011. Sexual Assault A person commits an offense if:

- -regardless of whether the person knows the age of the child at the time of the offense, the person intentionally or knowingly:
 - •(A) causes the penetration of the anus or sexual organ of a child by any means;
 - •(B) causes the penetration of the mouth of a child by the sexual organ of the actor;
 - •(C) causes the sexual organ of a child to contact or penetrate the mouth, anus, or sexual organ of another person, including the actor;
 - •(D) causes the anus of a child to contact the mouth, anus, or sexual organ of another person, including the actor; or
 - •(E) causes the mouth of a child to contact the anus or sexual organ of another person, including the actor.

NOT considered Sexual Assault

What is

Breast, vagina, penis, butt touch over the clothes is a Class C Misdemeanor, which will likely result in a ticket.

Breast, vagina, penis touch under the clothes is a felony.

Repeated offenses can escalate to Class B, Class A or felony.

Punishment, if any, can be probation, Sex Offender diversion programs or as high as jail time.

Judicial Systems:

Offenders age 17 and over are subject to the adult judicial system.

Offenders under the age of 17 are subject to the juvenile justice system.

Little Elm High School

- 1. Report sexual harassment/assault/misconduct incident to your House Principal or to the District's Title IX Coordinator.
- 2. Campus administration will speak with students and gather statements.
- 3. Campus administration will consult with LEISD Title IX Coordinator (if applicable, law enforcement will be consulted).
- 4. Supportive measures (appropriate for the situation) will be implemented.
- 5. Investigation will be completed by campus administrators or Title IX Investigator.
- 6. When applicable, consequences will be assigned.
- 7. If unsatisfied with investigation results, contact campus principal or Title IX Coordinator.

What should victims do/not do when there is an open case?

Avoid posting anything about the incident on social media.

If the suspect reaches out to the victim via social media, do not delete that information.

If the communication is on a platform that deletes after a certain amount of time, take a picture of the message with a camera or another phone before it is gone.

While the case is being investigated, victims should not talk to other parties or friends about the case (other than parents/caregivers, therapists, etc.)

The only person responsible for committing sexual assault is a perpetrator, but all of us have the ability to look out for each other's safety.

Your Role in Preventing Sexual Assault

- On average, there are over 293,000 victims (age 12 or older) of rape and sexual assault each year in the U.S.
- Bystanders might be present when sexual assault or abuse occurs—or they could witness the circumstances that lead up to these crimes.
- Practice Active Bystander Intervention interrupting a
 potentially harmful situation, especially when it comes to sexual
 violence.
 - Create a Distraction
 - Ask Directly
 - Rally Others
 - Extend Support
 - Your Actions Matter!

Create a Distraction

Interrupt incident safely by communicating with individual at risk giving them safe opportunity to escape.

Create conversation with individual at risk.

Cut off the conversation with a diversion like, "Let's get pizza, I'm starving," or "This party is lame. Let's try somewhere else."

Start an activity that draws other people in, like a game, a debate, or a dance party.

Develop a code word or phrase with friends for when you need help.

Extend Support

After experiencing such a situation, the individual at risk may feel panicked and be unsure about what to do next.

You can ask:

"Do you want me to walk with you to your destination?"

"Is there anything I can do to support you?"

"Would you like resources for support and guidance following this incident?"
